1. Can we meet you?

2. Tell us the story of how you met your husband and your first impression of him?

COHABITING

And it's negative effects on relationships. Mrs. Lanre Osineve

Cohabiting is a practice whereby a brother and sister live together and have a regular sexual relationship without being legally married.

Many of our sisters have adopted this way of life without recourse, remorse, or regard for what God thinks about the violation of their bodies sexually.

They intentionally shun the godly advice from the Holy Scripture because they believe they have a right to live their life the way they want, whereas it is not! Ultimately, we are all accountable to God. The Bible makes us understand that our body is the temple of the Holy Spirit.

1 Corinthians 6:19: 20

Do you not know that your bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your own; you were bought at a price. Therefore, honor God with your bodies.

Cohabiting with a man you are not legally married to is dishonoring God's word and defiling the matrimonial bed. Cohabitation is a sin, and it attracts divine judgment. Hebrews 13:4 says "Marriage is honorable among all, and the bed undefiled, but fornicators and adulterers God will judge."

Let's consider some of these common reasons why some sisters cohabit.

• The family problem from your parents: When there are issues in the home that have brought about separation or divorce in a marriage, it is likely for a lady from such a family background to end up cohabiting with a man she finds in her life, to find comfort and false love validation. Unknowingly, she has just begun the same journey where her parents ended their lives.

• Lost self-esteem: When a lady lacks self-worth, she will treat any man that comes her way as a king, and she will be ready to give him everything he desires in that relationship because she doesn't want to lose him. Sex will be frequent, and moving into his house will be another great option in her view, which will serve as the great mistake she has ever made when regrets begin to set in later.

Psalm 139:14 | praise you because | am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, | know that full well.

• Unwanted pregnancy: When you don't keep yourself pure in a relationship, there is a probability of you finding yourself with an unwanted pregnancy, and you end up cohabiting with the brother even if he isn't ready for Marriage.

• Because of financial commitments: Some sisters believe having an adequately planned Marriage can be financially draining and time-consuming. In contrast, a godly wedding doesn't have to be flamboyant. You can do it in such a way that it will suit your budget and that of your fiancé. I have heard of some couples calculating the dowry list and paying it off, perhaps because of stress or because they don't want the crowd together because of them, and afterward, they go to church with just their immediate family.

• Short-sightedness: Some ladies cohabit because they lack foresight; they don't know what the future holds for them, so they gullibly give in to the man.

• Timing: Many of our cohabiting sisters are in such relationships because they cannot wait further for their God-ordained suitable spouses. Their faith has died off, and their attention has now shifted to their own speculation rather than God's timing.

Negative Effects of Cohabiting on Relationships

1. It will affect your relationship with God. Hebrews 13:4 says, "Marriage is honorable among all, and the bed undefiled; but fornicators and adulterers God will judge." Going against God's instructions will hinder how you relate with God, affecting His relationship with you. Psalm 23:3:4 says, "Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? Or who shall stand in his holy place? He that hath clean hands, and a pure heart; who hath not lifted up his soul unto vanity, nor sworn deceitfully." Only people with clean hands and pure hearts can access the throne of God unhindered; anyone with stained garments can't freely have access, except she repents and stops working in the path of destruction.

2. Your Parents will be disappointed. There is nothing that ruins a parent and daughter relationship as much as getting to know that their daughter cohabitates. Every parent detests it and sees it as a shame that the child they have nurtured and invested so much in cannot make them proud. This tends to bring hostility between the parents and the daughter because it will make them feel like a failure.

When you cohabit with a man, you have simply told him you don't have responsible parents whom you can honor, so he can have you without going to them to seek your hand in Marriage. This is highly disheartening and can bring a curse upon you, which may also affect your generation because of the law of the harvest. Some parents have placed curses on their children for disobeying them, and they may not be able to have a breakthrough in life until they do the needful. Mind you, it can also be a seed you will likely reap from one of your children in the future, so be careful!

3. You have laid a bad precedent for your siblings. When you cohabitate, you are not only affecting yourself negatively. You indirectly lay bad precedence for your siblings, especially when you are the first child. Most of them may find themselves in a bad relationship because they have no one to look up to, and this is enough for them not to want anything to do with you in the future. Even those who didn't follow your path may find it challenging to get over the disappointment they got from you. I know you will not want to lose your dear siblings for a man that has no plan for you.

4. Loss of dignity: There is no way you will be sleeping in a man's house, and he will not take advantage of you. Research has shown that people who cohabit have sex more frequently than those who get married legally. Why? The reason is that there is no value for the woman because what you are supposed to allow him thousands of miles to get is being made available to him without any stress. This affects and destroys relationships more than you can ever think about. If you think you can hook a man down by providing him sex he does not deserve, he will use it against you sooner or later.

5. You have no entitlement to his property: This will affect your relationship with him one day as you begin to see the handwriting on the wall that you have no entitlement to his property because you are not legally married, and if peradventure he marries another woman outside and performs all the right over that lady, then, you are in for trouble because that person becomes the legal wife. She automatically has the right to her husband's possessions, while you have no right, even under the law. No woman later enjoys this relationship because they are often treated as second-class citizens when they ought to be the house's madam.

6. It complicates your lives: Cohabiting with a man as a lady will injure your future and affect the man. Cohabiting with each other without any plan for your future indicates a blurry vision. All your dreams go down the drain gradually, and you will become the shadow of your authentic self. Having to move in together early and untimely will make you both see no reason to pursue your goals, and this may cause you both to become miserable in life.

7. You are open to health risks: A man who refuses to pay your dowry and legalize your union has more chances of not being faithful to you because nothing has tied both of you together. This will make you live in fear and refuse to allow him to sleep with you sometimes because you're afraid of getting any sexually transmitted disease. This can affect your relationship with him because he will never agree not to sleep with you, and that does not mean he will stop flirting around.

8. Abuse is Inevitable: An adage says, "It is the market we purchase with money that we value." That is, the one that comes our way free of charge cannot be valued like the one we bought through the money we labour to get. So, in cohabitation, abuse usually will be the order of the day, especially when you have been trapped down with pregnancy or children. The fact that you are keeping your body away from him while you still live together may warrant some measure of abuse, which could be emotional, verbal, or physical, and if care is not taken, you may end up becoming depressed or losing your life.

Conclusion.

A lady who is cohabitating with a man is manifesting the work of the flesh because she is a fornicator, and the Bible says they will have their portion in the lake of fire (Galatians 5:19).



Things To put in place before you say "I Do"

So you are all set to tie the nuptial knot and the excitement is building up, but wait! Have you dotted your i's and crossed your t's?

It is advisable that couples do the last-minute checks, often known as the "tough talks". In reality, these are the actual talks that test the strength of the bond you've built over the entire period of courtship. At this stage, you should be able to stare each other in the face and discuss any topic (No matter how sensitive) lovingly and fearlessly. It is with this understanding that I suggest to you, these 7 aspects of marriage.

1. Faith: It is not enough to just be Christians, there is also the need to conclude on the place of worship after marriage. This may lead to discussions about doctrinal beliefs, church commitments, accepting responsibilities in the house of God, attendance of mid-week services, tithing, and giving to church projects.

2. Living and Livelihood: Will you both work full-time? If yes, will your workplaces be in the same city? If not, have you decided on the city to live in as you build your family? Who is more comfortable traveling distances between work and home? What is the nature of your jobs, and how do they affect family life? Will either of you need to change your current job to suit your marriage, and could this be achieved without feeling insecure, unequal with the other partner, or resentful? You will need to consider each other's opinions and many factors other than your pre-set youthful fantasies when deciding. Other questions like who may or may not live with you, and this includes pets, should not be left out.

3. Finances: Money matters rank very high among the significant causes of divorce today. The irony here is that it is not necessarily the absence of it, but more importantly, the mismanagement or the misappropriation of it causes more damage. In the spirit of financial transparency, couples should be open to discussing topics individual/total family around earnings. loans/debts, joint accounts, role plays in bills and settlements, giving to family and friends, and spending towards family socials. Intending couples should be willing to discuss financial strengths and weaknesses with each other without fear or shame. They should also hold each other's hands in love as they work on their weaknesses.

4. Health: Marital vows are sworn to take effect "in sickness and in health...till death..." Therefore, one of the conditions every marriage runs on is the health of each partner, whether good or bad. Intending need to confirm their couples medical compatibility, so they can give birth to healthy babies according to the expectation of God from Christian homes. Pre-existing health challenges should not be kept secret from each other. In discussing health, a partner who cannot handle that in marriage may leave, and they should not be judged. The other partner should believe God for a partner who can run in faith with them in marriage, and ultimately, for perfect healing. This is better than hiding a health condition to keep a spouse. You are better off alone with God than living with a resentful spouse.



5. Parenting: One of the purposes of Christian raise children marriaaes is to in the knowledge of God and to achieve this, both partners should be in harmony. How many children will you have? How would you respond to challenges like delay in childbearing? Would you be open to IVF, adoption, or surrogacy? Will your children spend holidays with close family and friends? How will you discipline your children? Intending couples should be aware that children blessings, are seeds not of separation. Therefore, even children should be taught that Daddy is Mummy's best friend, and they have one voice.

6. Social life: Humans are social beings, and whatever affects your relationship with others affects your emotions. What are the social activities that your partner enjoys? Are you interested in the same? If not, are you satisfied with being alone while they are away, or do you have some other social activities to keep you engaged? What is your opinion about old friends, new friends, and especially friends of the opposite sex? What boundaries will you both put in place to avoid offending each other because of third-party interference? Will you permit friends and/or family to live with you at some point? How long can you tolerate it? Intending couples need to understand each other's social preferences to avoid excessive distancing or otherwise.

7. Ambitions: What are your future plans that can affect your marriage? Do you intend to build a business, start an NGO, or switch jobs or roles in the current industry? Will your job require lots of traveling in the future? Do you have a call into ministry work as of now? If your partner gets called into ministry work, (e.g., pastoring a church, organizing rural evangelism, etc.) will you be willing to support them? If questions like these are not properly answered, couples may gradually out-grow each other as years go by.

In conclusion, marriage is a continuous responsibility, and new phases unfold as time passes. In other words, no one knows all there is to marriage from the very beginning. One of the last things to agree on is to keep the communication line open, interesting, and effective. Challenges abound, but the everpresent God assures us of victory ALWAYS. Intending couples need to agree to continue submitting to God and cooperating with each other in love.

PILLARS OF MARRIAGE

Marriage, by definition, is a union between a man (male) and a woman (female), according to Genesis 2:18 and Genesis 2:23. This institution is the Lord's. Since its inception, it has involved God, man, and woman. Not God, man, and man, or woman and woman. There are contemporary revisionist ideologies about marriage that are nothing short of devilish! Such should never be regarded as marriage according to biblical standards.

A pillar is an erected brick built to support a building. It provides a support system to the building, and any attempt to remove it may cause the house to collapse, so it is as essential as the foundation.

Therefore, marriage can be likened to a physical building that requires using original materials from the foundation level to the roofing for a solid establishment to be acquired. It is paramount to take time to identify which building you want to develop and carefully study what it would take to have your dream house. In Luke 14:28, Jesus said, "Which of you, desiring to build a tower, does not first sit down and count the cost, whether he has enough to complete it?"

Your decision on the kind of building you want to build determines how strong your foundation will be and how many pillars will be needed to support the house. Also, in a marriage that will stand the test of time, serious attention has to be given to the foundation because once the foundation is faulty, repairing the house may require that the whole house be demolished before anybody can correct the foundation, which often does more harm to the spouses, children, family members and the church.

When the foundation of a marriage is faulty, it often leads to separation or divorce, and until the foundations' errors are prayerfully and carefully corrected, there won't be restoration.

The following pillars must be in place for marriage with an appropriate foundation.

I. Jesus the Cornerstone: I Peter 2:5 says: "See, I lay a stone in Zion, a chosen and precious cornerstone, and the one who trusts in him will never be put to shame." Jesus Christ is the first and the best pillar everyone should have in marriage. No pillar will serve as the Cornerstone Himself, who owns marriages and everything that can help you have the best marriage on earth. Remember, no one who trusts Him will be put to shame, meaning there is coverage for your marriage from the enemy of this institution.

Jesus, as the cornerstone, will provide vital support to your marriage and build it with you. Psalm 127:1 tells us that Unless the LORD builds the house, its builders labor in vain. Unless the LORD watches over the city, the watchmen stand guard in vain. He can watch over home affairs and guard them jealously when you allow Him in your home.

2. Commitment: Commitment has 73% of making marriage work. Commitment, as one of the essential pillars of marriage, must be put in place by both husband and wife. The institution of marriage will function as it ought to when both spouses are involved in making their marriage work. Commitment seems to be tiring when only one part is faithful to it. Any marriage without 100% commitment from the couple cannot work because it requires knowing and doing the right thing. After all, it's your duty!

3. Communication: Good communication saves marriage more than one can ever imagine. In a home where the pillar of proper communication is not lacking, there is always mutual agreement, which often brings about unhindered progress among the couple. When couples communicate in a language their spouses can best understand and at a suitable time that the spouse can best digest and ponder on the words discussed, there is always a favorable familial response, not a selfish response. In other words, the decision always favors the entire family.

When the three Angels visited Abraham and discovered that they were to be entertained, he ran to the cave to meet his wife, Sarah, and discussed how to prepare food for the visitors. Sarah agreed and did as Abraham discussed, and the outcome favored both. Had there been a communication problem between them where the husband had to plead and plead before the wife could agree, the angels might have left them without any goodbye. They would have lost that miracle of having their promised child, Isaac (Genesis 18).

4. Cooperation: Amos 3:3 says, "Can two walk together except they are agreed?" A marriage can only work with the collaboration of the couple. A home cannot be habitable, especially for children, when parents are not cooperating. Disagreement will be the order of the day, which may involve yelling and physical and emotional abuse because of re<mark>sistance that is taking place between them.</mark>

Cooperation as a pillar of marriage has always been one of the bases of marriage right from the dating/courtship stage. Without it, marriage wouldn't have taken place because everything about the process of marriage requires the full cooperation of both bride and groom. This shows us that to keep the marriage still, this still has to be in place as it has been from the beginning of their union.

5. Faithfulness: Faithfulness to your marital yows makes things easier in marriage, especially when both couples know that God will hold them accountable if they fail to fulfill them. The marriage vow is not just for formality's sake; they are words that attract the presence of the hosts of heaven whenever it is read. Those proclamations are to be faithfully and diligently followed by every believer that does not want to end up in hell. It is better not to read it at all than to read it and not follow it.

"In the name of God, I, ____, take you, ____, to be my (wife/husband), to have and to hold from this day forward, for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, until parted by death. This is my solemn vow."



Therefore, as Christian couples who have children delay in marriage, how do we handle such challenges and fulfill the purpose of God in it? We shall be looking at the following parameters as a guide to handling delayed periods of childbearing in marriade.

Understanding God's Concept of Marriage (Gen 2: 18-25).

Couples must understand that the first reason for marriade establishment by God was to solve the problem of aloneness for man, and the woman to be the help that can meet such needs, and sometimes, vice versa.

Gen 2: 18 KJV "And the LORD God said, it is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a help meet for him."

We can see in that scripture that childbearing is not the first priority of God when He established marriage. However, we see that a lack of understanding of marriage makes us think that marriage is the primary and only reason for childbearing. It is just part of a marriage blessing.

Isaiah 55:11 "So shall my words be that goeth forth out of my, it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it"



During the period of children delays in marriage, the couple should learn how to rely on the words of God, because His words never fail but come to pass no matter how long. His written words (Bible) or His spoken word (prophecy, preaching, or declaration in the program) is powerful and faithful to perform its duty.

Both husband and wife should unanimously trust and believe the promise of God that each or both of them encountered concerning the challenge in question. I have shared my testimony in the previous publication in my write-up on how my husband and I trusted and believed the promise of the word of God during the period of our children delay.

God fulfilled His words, and we have our desired biological children to His Glory. God is faithful to His words, He keeps His promises with His people. He didn't fail Abraham and Sarah, and neither did He disappoint Hannah in His promise to give them children.

A definite request in prayers

Phil 4: 6 "Be careful for nothing; but in everything by prayer and supplication with Thanksgiving, let your requests be made known unto God." Anxiety, pressure, and agitation as a result of such challenges in marriage make some couples complain to God instead of making their request in prayers. Some are only expressing their grief and sadness to God by weeping and mourning about their challenges. These are not prayers but emotional expressions of their situation which God is aware of even before they expressed it.



God only wants us to make our definite request with the hope and thanksgiving that He will answer. In 1 Sam 1:11, Hannah poured her mind before God and clearly defined her request to Him in prayer and after which, she had her peace, believing and hoping that He had heard her request.

Summarily, a cordial relationship between a couple and God is the basic requirement of God for marriage, which gives birth to every other thing in marriage. Eccl 4: 9-12, vs12 "And if one prevail against him, two shall withstand him; a threefold cord is not quickly broken." Once this is absent in marriage, there would be no hope for fulfillment.

Our faith and trust in the words of God are also required, "Faith cometh by hearing and by hearing the word of God." Believing the words of psychology and the philosophy of men cannot solve our challenges but worsen them. Finally, a definite request in prayers without ceasing shows our dependence on God, which is what He requires from us.

3. Practice proper time management: Set a realistic schedule for everything and orientate your family about it, and involve your husband in planning activities for the two of you. For the children, set an ideal routine for them. Older children can be given simple household tasks. Most importantly, try to set a regular schedule for family bonding activities that everyone can look forward to.

4. Develop a positive attitude in every situation: No matter how tough it may be, strive to be grateful for the family you have. Avoid blaming your husband for not supporting you enough and making your children feel like they're becoming a burden to you. Try to assure them that even if you are tired or stressed out, they are still the most important people in your life.

5. Wives should learn how to be submissive: Apostle Paul said, "Wives submit yourself unto your own husband as unto the Lord" (Ephe 5:22). As a wife, you should submit your totality to your husband, respect, and honour him. Appreciate his commitment and do not talk negatively about your husband to your family, friends, or relatives because it will definitely bounce back on you (the wife).

6. Give attention to each child: For all your children, share special moments and do things they all enjoy – both quality time and quantity time. Provide spiritual training, cultural opportunities, and creative outlets appropriate for their ages.

9. Be available: As wives and mothers, we need the help of our family members, and our family needs our help. Let us be available for them, and be there when they want to talk to us. Let us listen to our husbands and advise them if required, and at the same time, be our children's advisers.

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
